



## Curriculum News

Our year is off and racing. At the start of any year there is always a great sense of excitement as improvement work is continued or begun. As a Richmond supporter, at the start of any new footy season, there is always a similar sense of anticipation. Will we make the final eight? Will we finish in 9th position? How will Dusty go?

All schools have an Annual Implementation Plan which outlines the goals, targets, and strategies for improvement work. My work, as Assistant Principal, is largely in relation to Curriculum and supporting teaching staff to deliver this work.

As outlined in the 2024 AIP we have targeted the following, and this is to:

\*Strengthen Year 3 Reading attainment level through embedding the F-2 Phonics Scope and Sequence.

\*Fine-tune and develop the Year 3-6 Spelling program
\*Develop teacher capacity in consistent use of formative data to drive needs-based instruction.

Our Learning Specialists (Brett Sargeant – Maths, Kris Portier – Literacy, Amy Sharman – Leader In Me/Student Voice and Agency) work with teaching teams to assist them in planning the curriculum. They are exemplary practitioners who model excellence in teaching through demonstration lessons. They mentor and coach teachers in improving their skills, knowledge, and effectiveness.

Assessment is used to identify and then target the needs of students. We also use Scope and Sequence documents to ensure that we are delivering a "guaranteed" curriculum. This is a mechanism through which all students have a school-wide agreement and common understanding of the essential content that all students need to know, understand, and be able to do. There are also expectations about how much time is allocated to curriculum areas.



Teachers are also involved in collaborative planning and student work is discussed. An example of this is the work Prep and Year 1 teachers are doing in Reading. Data is being collected from English Online Interviews to identify what knowledge students have about things such as print concepts, phonemic awareness and alphabet knowledge. From here teachers analyse this data to determine what students need to learn next, and they plan lessons accordingly



This term the Prep to 2 teachers have also had the opportunity to work with Literacy consultant, Mardi Gorman, as we fine-tune our phonics scope and sequence work. Teachers have been able to observe Mardi taking phonics sessions. They have then had time to ask questions and get down into learning about the nitty gritty of phonics instruction.

#### **Curriculum News**

Phonics approaches have been consistently found to be effective in supporting younger students to master the basics of reading, with an average impact of an additional five months' progress. Research suggests that phonics is particularly beneficial for younger students (4-7 year olds) as they begin to read. Teaching phonics is more effective on average than other approaches to early reading (such as whole language or alphabetic approaches), though it should be emphasised that effective phonics techniques are usually embedded in a rich



literacy environment for early readers and are only one part of a successful literacy strategy.

Systematic phonics approaches explicitly teach students a comprehensive set of letter sound relationships through an organised sequence. A phonics program will only be effective if it is delivered using effective pedagogy. How phonics is taught is important.

Consider the following when teaching a phonics program:

- Training ensure all staff have the necessary pedagogical skills and content knowledge
- Responsive check if learning can be accelerated or extra support is needed and identify specific capabilities and difficulties to focus teaching.
- Engaging lessons that engage students and are enjoyable to teach.
- Adaptations carefully consider any adaptations to the program, as they may reduce its impact.
- Focus a flexible approach to grouping students is likely to help focus effort and improve teaching efficiency.

Victorian Premiers' Reading Challenge

The Victorian Premiers' Reading Challenge is now open and Parktone Primary School is excited to be participating. The PRC application offers a range of exciting features including:

- access to a library catalogue (including book images and blurbs)
- a modern user-friendly interface
- rewarding students with badges as challenge milestones are achieved
- the option for students to mark books as a favourite, give them a star rating or complete a book review The Challenge is open to all children at Parktone in recognition of the importance of reading for literacy development. It is not a competition; but a personal challenge for children to read a set number of books the end of Term 3.

Children from Prep to Year 2 are encouraged to read or 'experience' 30 books with their parents and teachers. Children from Year 3 to Year 10 are challenged to read 15 books.

Students can log into the Premiers' Reading Challenge application from home or at school using their individual log ins that will be sent out next week.

All children who meet the Challenge will receive a certificate of achievement signed by the Victorian Premier and former Premiers.

## Literacy & Numeracy News

#### **Focus on Writing**

This week, the Parktone teachers attended a curriculum day focused on Writing, run by our Literacy Learning Specialist, Kristine Portier.

The day began with a focus on how we can consistently bring joy to our classrooms and ensure all student's social and emotional wellbeing is attended to through our teaching. We looked at our Attitudes to School Survey to identify areas our students would like more support with and planned ways to incorporate more of their interests through the curriculum.

The main aspect of the day was developing a consistent language around writing. The 6+1 Traits of Writing are an excellent foundation for our teachers to incorporate in their planning, as they help minimise the subjectivity that inevitably comes with teaching and assessing writing.

We looked at a number of mentor texts that allow students to examine the traits in detail, through the incredible writing of other authors. We explored our writer's notebooks and spoke of the importance of our students (and teachers!) developing an authentic relationship with them, in order to collect important ideas for future use. The staff were pushed out of their comfort zones and asked to complete a number of exercises that we commonly ask our students to do, and it was illuminating to realise how challenging, and rewarding, it can be.

Finally, the teachers worked in teams to plan exciting and purposeful writing sequences for the coming weeks. Using all their learning from the day around joy, student voice, rich mentor texts and the 6 + 1 Traits, all teams were able to forward plan exciting and engaging writing lessons for their students.

It was an incredible day and we look forward to continuing to develop your children's love of writing.

#### **Maths at Parktone**


I thought I would use the newsletter to share what different parts our Maths lessons look and feel like at Parktone. Today, I will elaborate on our Daily Reviews with our school community. These happen at the beginning of each Maths lesson.

Daily Reviews are an opportunity to see if lessons taught in previous weeks have stuck with students. We revise questions on our interactive whiteboard with the whole class, one question at a time. Unlike, when most parents were in school, it is not a raise your hand to respond, or the teacher calling on one or two students to respond. Instead, students each have a mini-whiteboard and respond to the question individually. This allows teachers to check for student understanding and make note of those who require some additional support with the maths concept being reviewed. If you were a fly on the wall in one of our Daily Review sessions, you would hear the teacher asking students to 'up tools' (get ready to respond on your whiteboards), 'chin it!' (hold your whiteboard under your chin to show your response) and 'tools down' (whiteboards down and the focus is back on the teacher). The great benefit of using the whiteboards is that everyone is involved in the review, it is not a race to be the first to respond and it allows the teacher to get immediate feedback about all students.


We also love visiting our school library to borrow books to read with our families at home.

#### Parktone Victories

Over the weekend of 10/11 February, Athletics Victoria staged the Southern Metro Regionals at Duncan MacKinnon Reserve. Year 4 students Ashton Mee and Tyra Shuttleworth enjoyed fantastic success. Following on from the Regionals, both Ashton and Tyra will now head off to compete in the State Championships which will be held at Casey Fields in Cranbourne on 9 and 10 March.

Ashton Mee (4A) competed in several events including shot put, long jump, discuss, 60 metre hurdles and high jump. For the second consecutive year, Ashton won the high jump competition and qualified for the Victorian Athletics Championships. He also finished fifth in shot put and sixth in the 60m hurdles and the discus.





Tyra Shuttleworth (4A) competed in several events including the 100m sprint, 200m sprint, 60m hurdles and long jump. Tyra won a gold medal in the 100m sprint, 200m sprint and 60m hurdles as well as a silver medal in the long jump. She has also qualified for the Victorian Athletics Championships.
