### **Aerobics Season Highlights**



- Japanese Day: students will enjoy a day of fun activities celebrating Japanese culture.




### From the Assistant Principal







They invited local primary schools to join the celebration, recognising that with NAPLAN now held in March, much of the foundation for this success is built through the work done in Years 5 and 6.

During our visit, we observed classes in action and engaged in valuable discussions about teaching practice. Next term, Parkdale Secondary will visit us to observe our Literacy and Numeracy sessions. This exchange is a great opportunity for us to learn from one another and explore ways to better prepare our students for secondary school.

As part of this preparation, we are introducing a novel study in Year 6. Each student will receive their own copy of a novel, which will be explored in depth throughout the term.

Recently, the school's Attitudes to School Survey results have been released. I look forward to sharing these with you next term. They are amazing!
